## New DANTES Director reports onboard this month



Jeffrey Allen will assume the DANTES Director title Sept. 20, traveling all the way from Hawaii, where he served as the Executive Director of Manpower, Personnel and Services for Headquarters Pacific Air Forces, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam.

Allen began his federal service career in 1983 as an Intern

with the U.S. Air Force. He dedicated the next 32 years serving in a variety of education and training, personnel and force support assignments at both the installation and Headquarters level.

He spent his first 16 years at Seymour Johnson AFB, N.C., in a variety of education jobs, before moving to Misawa AB, Japan, in 1999 as Chief, Education and Training Flight. Then, in 2001, he made his last (almost) move to the island paradise of Hawaii.

At what was, at the time, Headquarters Pacific Air Forces, Hickam AFB, his jobs included: Education Specialist; Chief, Education Services; Chief, Education and Training Branch; Chief, Airman Development Division; and Chief, Personnel Division.

In 2009, he moved up to Executive Director, Manpower, Personnel and Services, at the newly combined Joint Base Pearl Harbor- Hickam.

Allen has earned numerous awards and honors, including 2002 Federal Employee of the Year, State of Hawaii; Civilian of the Year, Headquarters Pacific Air Forces, Directorate of Personnel (twice); Education/ Counselor of the Year (four times); Pacific Air Forces Nathan Altschuler Award, Best Education Services Flight in PACAF (twice); 2006 General Horace M. Wade Innovation Award, Pacific Air Forces; and 2000 Air Force Exemplary Civilian Service Award.

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## Revised credit recommendations for select CLEP exams

The American Council on Education's College Credit Recommendation Service (ACE CREDIT®) evaluates and recommends credit for more than 30,000 programs nationwide. ACE periodically re-evaluates programs and exams and recently performed a review of 32 of the College Board's 33 College-Level Examination Program (CLEP®) exams, confirming their content quality and rigor.

While the credit recommendations for most exams remain unchanged, semester hours for the following eight CLEP subject areas were updated, and only the Level 2 recommendations for the World Language exams have changed.

## DANTES Fully Funded program looking for more participants

With the closeout of CLEP and DSST paper and pencil exams worldwide, the testing agencies and DANTES have implemented a Fully Funded program. This program was implemented to facilitate the transition of DANTES Test Sites without National Test Centers (NTCs) to 100 percent Internet-based testing. In addition, the program ensures that nearby community test centers are available for Service members to take a College-Level Examination Program® (CLEP) or DSST® exam without paying the administrative fee.

DANTES wants more institutions involved in this program, so we are asking military bases without NTCs to notify DANTES of any on-campus institution that may be interested in becoming a part of the Fully Funded program. The testing agencies will then reach out to recruit that school for the Fully Funded program.

For those institutions interested in the Fully Funded program, DANTES will provide funding for the initial (first time) exam cost of a CLEP or DSST exam test title administered to eligible military test-takers. DANTES will also fund the administrative fee charged by the on-campus NTC at the negotiated administrative fee rate.

## Five best practices for DSST® test centers

Wayland Baptist University at Lackland AFB, Texas, is a DSST Center of Excellence that applies five best practices to make the test center successful.

### 1. Be ready

When examinees arrive for their exam appointment, have all DSST information neatly organized. Flyers, documents, brochures, and procedural documents should be held in easy-to-reach places. A three-ring binder with protective covers is suitable for storing this information.

### 2. Verify candidate IDs

After examinees sign in on the DD Form 1572, check their military ID to ensure eligibility for DAN TES funding and to ascertain identity. Even though candidates are military members, it is imperative to check their identity before testing.

### 3. Be vigilant

Count the number of scratch paper sheets each examinee receives before the exam, and the number of sheets that each examinee returns at the end of the exam. All cell phones must be turned off completely and placed in a secure area. Be aware of any devices such as Google glasses, ear pieces, or other electronic recording devices, as well as any unusual tattoos that examinees may have.

### 4. Prepare the test taker

Review all exam instructions and testing room procedures, such as restroom breaks, location of pencils, clocks, etc., with the examinees before the exam. Entertain all of their questions or concerns so that they can have a successful testing experience. Providing the examinee a printed “road map” detailing the Prometric DSST account creation can be helpful, as well as using a standard formula for creating the username and password for all examinees (i.e. username = first name up to five letters + birth month + birth day; password = last name up to five letters plus birth year + one symbol + one upper case letter). This standardized format helps returning candidates who may have forgotten their login information.

### 5. Special considerations

The Public Speaking exam is unique in that it has an audio component which, for the comfort and concentration of the examinee, is best done in an audiology booth or in a private area away from the other examinees. Although there is a six-month period allowed between the multiple choice portion and the audio portion, it is recommended that the audio portion be done as soon as possible to complete the exam.

## ACT 2014-2015 test cycle administrative reminders

TCOs: before placing an order for ACT test materials, look in your safe. The 2014-2015 ACT test booklets expire on Oct. 31 and cannot be used after that date. Obsolete test booklets must be postmarked for return to the testing agency prior to Oct. 31, 2015. All completed answer folders must be received at ACT no later than Nov. 10, 2015, or they will not be scored due to changes in the ACT scoring system.

Per the DAN TES Examination Program Handbook (DEPH) Part II, ACT Chapter 2, TCOs are reminded to ensure obsolete and unused answer folders are destroyed properly per Service destruction guidelines.

DAN TES stocking test sites will need to amend their inventory to reflect the return of testing materials. Remember, new test materials will not be sent until ACT reconciles their inventory.

New test materials may be ordered in October. See DEPH page II-2-6, ACT Chapter 2, for procedures to order 2015-2016 ACT materials.

### Reminder

ACT exams are:

- » not automatically distributed each year
- » not distributed until all previous years materials are received and cleared at ACT
- » reusable only at stocking DAN TES test sites.
- » ordered using the ACT DAN TES Order Form

## Common JST/ACE questions and answers

Frequently asked questions can often highlight a gap in information and understanding among customers. For the Military Evaluations program, DANTEs, the Joint Service Transcript (JST) Operations Team, the American Council on Education's (ACE) Center for Education Attainment and Innovation (CEAI) Resource Center, and the Military Evaluations Program customer service centers all answer Service member questions about their JST.

With the exception of the Air Force, the military Services have transitioned to the new Joint Services Transcript system. The JST documents ACE college credit recommendations for military Service training, education, and occupational experiences. It also includes college courses and test scores for college-level exams taken while in the military.

The following list is provided to help education counselors and representatives from academic institutions as they assist Service members in using their JST for degree planning.

### **I am a retiree. Where do I send my certificates and/or DD Form 1059 for evaluation?**

The DD Form 1059 process was replaced by the JST. Even if a member left the military prior to the launch of the program, they should still have a JST. Direct them to either view or register for an account at <https://jst.doded.mil>.

### **How do I register for a JST account?**

To register for an account, Service members should go to the JST website at <https://jst.doded.mil>. Members with a Common Access Card (CAC) and that were prior enlisted do not need to register for a JST account (JST should already have their personnel record). If the



message stating 'No record found' is received or they do not have CAC access, directions to register are on the home page. Members must send an email to JST at [jst@doded.mil](mailto:jst@doded.mil) in order for a transcript to be built.

Members may also utilize the Military Guide online to check the review status of courses attended. [www.acenet.edu/news-room/Pages/Military-Guide-Online.aspx](http://www.acenet.edu/news-room/Pages/Military-Guide-Online.aspx).

### **How do I view and print my personal/unofficial transcript?**

Once members log into the JST website, they should select the "Transcripts" link. From there, members can view their transcript by using the "Transcript" link. The transcript contains sections for Military Course Completions, Military Experience, College Level Test Scores, and Other Learning Experiences. There are options to print or save the transcript.

### **How do I update my JST?**

Service-specific instructions for updating the JST are at <https://jst.doded.mil/correction.html>. When requesting updates to the JST, advise members to include their name, last four digits of the social security number (SSN), and an email address on submitted documents. Also, advise that awards and local training that do not have military course identification numbers will NOT appear on the JST.

When documentation is submitted, it may take approximately 15 days before the change is reflected on the JST. After logging in, the 'Transcript Update Status' link will indicate when the documents were received and the current status of the change request.

### **Do all colleges/universities accept the recommended college credit listed on JST?**

It is up to each academic institution to decide what ACE credit recommendations can be accepted, modified, or rejected. Whether an academic institution accepts the credit recommendations depends on its policies and procedures for transfer credit, the program of study, and the degree requirements.

### **How do I send my transcripts to a school?**

Unlike ordering transcripts from a college or university, there is no cost for ordering a JST transcript.

### **JST/ACE Q&As**

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Service members can order transcripts directly from their account on the JST website. After logging onto the JST website, click the "Transcript" link at the top of the page, then on the "Transcripts Menu", and finally click the "Official Transcript Request" link. On the next page, search for the school and select the institution from the list. Select the correct institution (verifying spelling and the location are correct) in the search results. On the next page, acknowledge the consent statement and click "Yes."

In the event a school is not listed, members will be directed to have the school representative contact JST at [jst@doded.mil](mailto:jst@doded.mil) and request their school be added.

### **I received the message "This account has been disabled." What should I do?**

Service member accounts will be locked after three unsuccessful login attempts or if the account has not been logged into within the last 30 days.

For lock outs due to unsuccessful login attempts, members must send an email to [jst@doded.mil](mailto:jst@doded.mil) and request to have the account unlocked. JST will need the member's full name and the last four digits of the SSN. Do NOT send the entire SSN. Do not register for a new account, it will be locked out as well.

For accounts disabled due to 30 days of inactivity, members will have to register again for a JST account.

### West Point graduate perfect match for superintendent

Steven Parker received his Bachelor of Science in National Security/Public Affairs from The United States Military Academy, West Point, N.Y., in 1986. He was commissioned in the U.S. Army Military Police Corps soon after. While on active duty, he earned a Master of Business Administration from Florida Tech. Parker was medically retired in October 1994, and began substitute teaching as he was trying to figure out what to do with his life. It was while substituting that he realized teaching was his passion. This became the beginning of his long journey in education, roots to treetops.

Parker registered with Troops to Teachers (TTT) in 1995 and worked on his teaching license while taking courses with two different universities. Parker notes that TTT helped with his transition from Service to civilian life with mentoring, job placement assistance, and a stipend he qualified for after he was hired, to supplement his regular salary.

He was hired as a full-time math and history teacher in Culpeper County, Va., in 1995, and coached football and wrestling to also stipend his salary.

Taking advantage of leadership skills learned in the military, Parker felt he could serve again in a different capacity by becoming an administrator. After completing a Master of Education in Education Leadership and earning his administrator's license through George Mason University, he became an assistant principal at Orange County High School in 2000. He then moved to Warren County Middle School in 2003, in the same position.

In 2005, Parker took over as the principal of Cedar Lee Middle School in Bealeton, Fauquier County, Va. It was there he led the school to increasing levels of student achievement. He earned the Washington Post Distinguished Educational Leader Award in 2013, and was named the Outstanding Middle School Principal of Virginia by the Virginia Association of Secondary School Principals.

Parker was recently selected as the superintendent of Lancaster County, Va., public schools. School board chairman Dr. Robert Westbrook said, "He will be good with this school system. He's got a great background, but it was also his enthusiasm, caring personality, and drive. He's going to be gung-ho."

In a public message released by Lancaster public schools, Parker states, "Educating our children takes more than 180 school days and more than time in a classroom seat. It takes a community commitment to creating and maintaining high expectations of ourselves, as well as our youth. I pledge to you my unwavering support for you, as a parent, community member or student, to ensure that we maintain high standards of professionalism, respect and equity. I encourage you to let us know how we are doing in partnering with you to ensure student learning. I remain available to you to answer questions, listen to concerns, or entertain ideas. This is OUR school division, these are OUR children, and they are OUR future. Your role is vital to the collective success we will enjoy in the years to come."

## FROM THE FIELD

### TTT participant shares good news from his first year of teaching

As a former U. S. Marine and member of Troops to Teachers (TTT), I would like to share some good news. I live and teach in Cullowhee, N.C., at Cullowhee Valley School, a Title 1, high need school. I am also a lateral entry teacher and have an NC INSPIRE teaching fellowship. I completed my first year of teaching 8th grade science last spring and, at the end of the school year, I was called in by the principal for my evaluation.

I was really worried, especially about how my students performed on the End-Of-Grade tests (EOGs). The principal looked at me and said, “In all my years teaching, I have never seen a first year teacher do what you did.” Now, I was really worried. I thought I was about to get broadsided because my students did so poorly on the EOG. But, instead, she told me that my students had gotten 79.9 percent on the EOGs, and she’d never seen a first-year teacher achieve that in all her year’s teaching. She also told me she was very ‘tough’ on evaluations and she never gave away high evaluations, but she had to give me what I’d honestly earned, and she gave me several ‘accomplished’ on my evaluation. She told me she’d never done that before for a first-year teacher.

I was overjoyed. And I want to share this good news because it proves that former Service members can become worthy, valuable, and highly successful teachers who have so much to offer students. There are many students who need solid adult role models in their lives, like my students, many of whom come from backgrounds of generational poverty.

If you are a Veteran thinking about teaching or joining the TTT program, your continued

service can be critical to the lives of the kids who hold the key to the future of our country. Once, as military members, we dedicated our lives to the Service of our country, committed to protecting what we love. I salute all Veterans who are now serving as teachers and encourage the rest of you to consider what may well be the most rewarding commitment of your life.
